

# WONDERS OF AMERICA

**One deep dive**  
The deepest point in the U.S. is about 1,930 feet.

**Super splash**  
This California water attraction is 2,425 feet from top to bottom.

**Blowing off steam**  
The hot spring at Yellowstone National Park can shoot water more than 300 feet into the air.

**Home sweet home**  
Found in Colorado, this multi-story bubble is an impressive run at over 200 feet long with about 151 rooms.

**Super size**  
This body of water is the largest lake of the five Great Lakes, and covers about 31,820 square miles.

**Blow you away**  
New Hampshire holds the world record for wind gusts of 231 mph.

**Into the blue**  
The coastal body of water is about 200 miles long and 30 miles wide.

**A true rock star**  
It's the only living coral system in North America and measures about 221 miles long.

**Drift away**  
This pier system stretches more than 3,700 miles.

**Amazing arch**  
Completed in 1965 and found in St. Louis, Missouri, this structure is 630 feet tall.

**Into the darkness**  
This Kentucky cave system has about 365 miles of explored and mapped passages.

Found in Utah, this sandstone wonder is 42 feet thick, 275 feet long and 230 feet tall.

**What a site**  
This Arizona gorge is about 277 miles long, 15 miles wide and one mile deep.

**Turn up the heat**  
This place in California and Nevada has average temperatures up to 130 degrees and a record of 134 degrees.

**Trail from Canada**  
This trail is about 100 miles long.
